Parents ... When Will They Ever Grow Up?

CHARACTERS

(2 Girls, 2 Guys)

Marcia: Girl whose parents fight over stupid stuff. She thinks they act like children.

April: Girl whose Dad and stepmother are too lovey-dovey, like they're on a second honeymoon or something. She feels like the third wheel.

Spencer: Guy whose parents never fight ... because they are never around each other. At first he thinks that's great, but then his friends make him paranoid that something is wrong.

Lincoln: Guy who lives with only his dad and thinks he's got it made. Mostly. Sometimes he wishes there was a woman in the house.

SETTING

This can be located anywhere: at one of the character's house, at a restaurant, at a school lunch table, etc.

- 1 MARCIA: Sometimes I swear that I am the parent and my mom
- and dad are the children. They are so ridiculous!APRIL: Oh boy. Here we go again.
- 4 MARCIA: I know. Seriously. I'm only twelve and can act one hundred percent more mature than them.
- 6 APRIL: Now I'm curious. What'd they do?
- 7 MARCIA: Got in another stupid fight this weekend.
- 8 APRIL: Over what?
- 9 MARCIA: Meat.
- 10 SPENCER: Meat? How in the world do you fight about meat?
- 11 MARCIA: Exactly. Not only how do you fight about meat, but
- 12 why would any sane, mature person ever fight about
- something stupid like meat in the first place? I mean, come
- on, fighting about politics, religion, money, sure, but meat?
- 15 LINCOLN: So what's the story? How did they fight about meat?
- 16 MARCIA: My mom and dad were making this new pork
- 17 barbeque dish and Mom said to do it one way and Dad said
- to do it another way and bam! A full-fledged war occurred.
- 19 They didn't speak for two whole days.
- 20 APRIL: Really? Two days over that?
- 21 SPENCER: What happened to the barbeque? Did you ever eat it?
- 22 MARCIA: Not even a little. It never became barbeque. My mom
- 23 threw the whole thing in the trash when Dad started
- arguing with her over how to fix it.
- 25 LINCOLN: She threw away perfectly good meat? Now that is something to get mad about. Even I'm mad now!
- 27 MARCIA: Do you know how uncomfortable it is to be in a house
- with two people who aren't even speaking to each other?
- 29 They both act all nice and sweet to me overly so but
- 30 won't even look at each other. Over meat!
- 31 APRIL: That stinks. But I think I'd rather have that than what
- 32 I've got.
- 33 MARCIA: What could possibly be wrong at your house? Your dad
- and Shelia just got married a few months ago. Don't tell
- 35 me they're having trouble already.

- APRIL: I wish! Oh no. It's way worse than that. They are all over each other. Like teenagers or something.
- SPENCER: Well, your stepmom is kind of hot.
- APRIL: Gross! (Punches SPENCER's arm.) She even sits in my dad's lap when they watch TV sometimes. Isn't she a little old for that?
- MARCIA: At least they're happy and not ignoring each other.
- APRIL: No. They're ignoring me! It's like I don't even exist.
- They're like lovesick puppies, always staring at each other and kissing. I'm telling you, it's disgusting!
- II LINCOLN: That would be rough. Nobody likes to see that!
- 12 MARCIA: Especially when it's your parents.
- APRIL: Stepparent. I feel like a third wheel in my own house. It was so much better when it was just me and my dad.
- 15 LINCOLN: Tell me about it. My dad and I have it made. No girls16 in the house equals no drama.
- 17 MARCIA and APRIL: Hey!
- SPENCER: It's the truth. Two guys alone in a bachelor pad has got to be pure heaven, right, Lincoln?
- 20 LINCOLN: (Slight pause) Well, I wouldn't say pure heaven. I mean, sometimes it'd be nice to have a chick around. My dad isn't exactly a top-notch cook, you know.
- MARCIA: Maybe you and your dad should take a cooking class.
 You shouldn't want a woman just to cook for you.
- LINCOLN: Oh, we wouldn't want one just to cook. She could clean too. Our house is a wreck!
- APRIL: (Obviously getting riled up) Oh my gosh! No wonder your dad doesn't have a wife. With attitudes like that, who —
- 29 MARCIA: (Jumping in) For real! How chauvinistic to think a
 30 woman would even want to cook and clean for you two
 31 ungrateful slobs.
- 32 LINCOLN: (To SPENCER) See what I mean? No girls equals no drama!
- 34 SPENCER: For real.
- 35 MARCIA: Maybe it's the guy who causes all the drama. Did you

- ever think about that? One time my dad didn't speak the whole time we were eating just because he didn't like his
- dinner. He was so mad and he ruined everyone else's time
 by sitting there all angry over nothing
- by sitting there all angry over nothing.APRIL: Sounds like your dad gets mad about food a lot.
- 6 MARCIA: I know! And it was my birthday dinner.
- SPENCER: Well I don't see how him sitting there quietly causedany drama. He wasn't crying and carrying on, was he?
- 9 MARCIA: No. But once *he* got mad, then my *mom* got mad, and then she yelled at him for being ridiculous and then dinner
- was ruined.
- 12 LINCOLN: So you see, your mom started the drama.
- 13 APRIL: Of course you would see it that way. It's always the girl's fault, isn't it?
- 15 LINCOLN: Hey, you said it. Not me.
- 16 MARCIA: Whatever. Guys cause drama way more than women
- do. They just don't ever admit it. They think that just
- because they don't cry and get all emotional that they're
- not the problem. But I'll take Mom's crying over Dad's
- 20 mean angry-at-the-world face any day.
- 21 SPENCER: That's because girls are too sensitive. A guy should
- be able to be mad over his food if he wants to. Especially
- 23 if he's hungry!
- 24 LINCOLN: And especially if his wife throws a perfectly good
- 25 piece of meat in the trash.
- 26 MARCIA: So you think it's no big deal that my parents fought
- over that stupid barbeque for two whole days? A whole
- weekend wasted over that perfectly good piece of meat?
- 29 LINCOLN: Well, maybe not two whole days ...
- 30 SPENCER: I'm just lucky that my parents never act like that. I
- can't remember the last time they had a fight.
- 32 LINCOLN: I can't remember the last time I even saw your parents together.
- 34 SPENCER: True. Even when they're in the same house, they're
- 35 always apart. Dad's in the living room and Mom's

- in her office.
- MARCIA: Well, that's not good.
- APRIL: Sounds like maybe things are worse at your house than anyone's.
- SPENCER: How do you figure that? My house is *always* quiet and peaceful.
- 7 APRIL: Exactly. Too quiet and peaceful.
- SPENCER: No such thing.
- MARCIA: Oh yes there is. When things get quiet at my house,
- that's when things are really bad. That's when I start
- worrying that I'm going to get the whole "We love you and
- it isn't you, it's us" speech. Then my dad will move out and the divorce papers will come in the mail.
- 14 SPENCER: Oh, come on. That's stupid. You just said you hate it when your parents fight.
- 16 MARCIA: Yeah, but I hate it even more when they don't. The no-
- speaking thing is way worse. (APRIL and LINCOLN nod in
 - agreement.)
- 19 SPENCER: You guys are just jealous because my parents are
- 20 normal. They aren't ripping out each other's throats or
 - making out on our couch. They're just going on about their
- 22 lives —

- 23 APRIL: Alone.
- 24 SPENCER: They're not alone!
- 25 LINCOLN: Might as well be. Dude, think about it. You all don't
- 26 even eat together.
- 27 SPENCER: Who does these days? We're a busy family.
- 28 LINCOLN: Every night? Even on the weekends?
- 29 SPENCER: (Thinking for a moment) So they like to eat separately.
- Big deal. What's the harm in that? It's better than eating together and fighting over meat!
- 32 MARCIA: If you say so.
- 33 SPENCER: Of course I say so! This is the most ridiculous thing
- I've ever heard. I'm supposed to be upset because my
- parents are too mature to fight about stupid things?

- 1 APRIL: A couple who fights together stays together.
- 2 SPENCER: You just made that up. Couples do not have to fight!
- 3 You guys need some serious therapy, you know that?
- 4 MARCIA: Yeah, when *you're* trying to decide who to live with, you'll need some too.
- 6 APRIL: Or who you want to spend Christmas and Thanksgiving with.
- 8 LINCOLN: Maybe your dad will get a hot new wife like April's dad!
- 10 APRIL: Hey!
- 11 LINCOLN: Sorry, but it's true!
- 12 SPENCER: Look, my parents are fine. They are not getting a
- 13 divorce. Maybe after fifteen years of marriage they just like
- their alone time. That's not a bad thing. In fact, I think
- right now I could use a little alone time myself! (Walks off
- 16 angrily.)
- 17 APRIL: Oh, come on, Spencer! Don't be that way! We were just
- 18 kidding! I'm sure your parents are just fine.
- 19 MARCIA: You know I'd give anything to have parents that don't
- 20 fight over meat.
- 21 APRIL: Or a stepmom that doesn't look and act like a lovesick
- 22 teenager.
- 23 LINCOLN: Or a father who knows how to cook and clean up
- 24 after himself. (The three stop yelling after SPENCER, look at
- 25 each other, and laugh.)
- 26 MARCIA: Geez, we've got it bad, don't we?
- 27 APRIL: For real. (They start walking Off-Stage while saying the
- 28 following lines.)
- 29 LINCOLN: You think our parents will ever grow up?
- 30 MARCIA: Doubtful.
- 31 APRIL: I just hope we don't grow up to be just like them.
- 32 LINCOLN: Not a chance.

After-Hours at the Superheroes Club

CHARACTERS

(2 Girls, 2 Guys)

- **Superhero 1:** A male masked superhero who is jealous that the others don't have to suffocate behind one, too.
- **Superhero 2**: Male superhero who wears tights for mobility, but is *not* happy about it.
- **Superhero 3**: Female superhero who wishes it didn't matter how she looked. Would be a whole lot easier *not* wearing heels when saving the world.
- **Superhero 4:** Female superhero who has to see a chiropractor for back problems.

SETTING

Heroes are sitting around a coffee club-type place talking about their day. It quickly becomes a competition of who has it the worst and how ungrateful people are.
